### Background

#### Methodology

- Statewide sample of 803 active voters (i.e., with any post -2007 vote history)
- Interviews conducted by telephone March 3-4, 2013
  - Landline and cell phones were included in the sample
- Margin of error of ±4% for 803 cases
- Typical interview was about 15 minutes




### Key findings and conclusions

A poll of 800 active voters in Ohio

- Ohio voters do not think there is a healthcare crisis in Ohio, so presumably they don't endorse sweeping changes in healthcare programs and coverages. Most are very satisfied with their own healthcare plans.
- Only 4% are Medicaid recipients themselves, but 31% see Medicaid as "very important" to themselves or their families. A robust 80% of Ohio voters would enroll in Medicaid if they needed coverage and they qualified, so the notion of adding more recipients like themselves to the Medicaid rolls is conceivable to the electorate.
- But 43% oppose expansion generally; and 46-49% oppose when given specific details of proposed expansion, including eligibility levels and numbers of new recipients; opinions about expansion split sharply along party lines, with about two-in-three Republican-primary voters (65%-66%) opposed when told of proposed expansion details.
- Opposition to expansion is justified firstly by concerns about rushing to approve expansion when estimates for costs vary so widely, and by concerns about waste, fraud, and abuse in the Medicaid system.


# Most important issue facing people in your own part of Ohio today is ...?





## Most important issue facing people in own part of Ohio today profile of selected categories with the highest percentages of "healthcare"




### Most important issue facing people in own part of Ohio today profile of selected categories with the highest percentages of "jobs & employment"

Roughly one-half of all Democrats rank see "jobs and employment" as their top issue






## Most important issue facing people in own part of Ohio today? profile of REPUBLICANS ONLY with the highest percentages of "healthcare"






### Best describes Ohio's healthcare system today?





### Rating of own personal healthcare coverage




Most voters are happy with their own healthcare coverage.



### Rating of own personal healthcare coverage



### Pays for more of own personal healthcare expenses







### Importance of Medicaid program for you & your family




About one-third 31%) of Ohio voters see Medicaid as very important to their own families.




## Importance of Medicaid program for you & your family profile of selected categories with the highest percentages of "very important"

Minorities, Democrats, and low socio-economic status voters are most likely to see Medicaid as very important to their own families






## Importance of Medicaid program for you & your family profile of REPUBLICANS ONLY with highest percentages of "very important"






# Would enroll in Medicaid program if uninsured, needed healthcare & qualified





# Words that might describe Ohio's Medicaid program — most and least descriptive






#### Like most or like least about Ohio's Medicaid program? Open-ended, verbatim comments on the program

Negative comments far outnumber positive ones when poll respondents were given the chance to say anything they chose to say



Changing the rules for Ohio Medicaid to allow more people to qualify for coverage under Medicaid


Opinions on expansion are polarized along party lines, with majorities of Democrats favoring and majorities of Republicans opposing (see two charts that follow on pages 20-21)


profile of selected categories with the highest percentages of "favor"







profile of selected categories with the highest percentages of "oppose"







### Favor or oppose?


Expanding Medicaid coverage to all uninsured state residents with household income levels up to 138% of the current federal poverty level

Again, opinions are sharply divided along partisan lines: 71% of Democratic primary voters favor such expansion while 65% of Republican primary voters oppose it



Because there is so much disagreement among experts on the costs of expanding Medicaid, we shouldn't rush into any expansion until we have a better handle on the financial consequences	50%	40%	61%


### **Direction of things in Ohio today**






#### **Direction of things in Ohio today**

profile of selected categories with the highest percentages of "right direction"






### John Kasich reelect & strength of opinion






### Your own state legislators' reelection?





## Under Governor Kasich's proposed budget, state government spending will go up 10.5% in 2014 & another 6.8% in 2015





Under Governor Kasich's proposed budget, he reduces the state income tax by 20% by increasing other taxes, including taxes on energy companies, farmers & landowners that extract oil & gas in Ohio & also by broadening the state sales tax to some services that are currently exempt from sales taxes
