


OHIO PRIVATE-SECTOR EMPLOYMENT (MILLIONS)

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

NOTES: Though Oklahoma, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin, Kentucky, and West Virginia appear as Right-to-Work states, their data are a combination of both Right-to-Work and Forced-Unionization data. Oklahoma, Indiana, Michigan, and Wisconsin became Right-to-Work states in 2001, 2012, 2013, and 2015, respectively. Kentucky and West Virginia became Right-to-Work states in 2017. Missouri became a Right-to-Work state in 2017 but returned to Forced-Unionization in 2018.
