
Exodus Ohioans Pull \$16.44 Billion from State Since 2011

In just one year, Ohio lost another \$2.14 billion in Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) as Ohioans leaving for greener pastures exceeded those out-of-staters coming to Ohio. Exodus Ohioans fled to RED states (8 out of top 10 states), including COLD weather states (4 out of 10), where economic policies feature no income tax, right-to-work, and robust infrastructure, whereas Ohio attracted BLUE-staters less repelled by Ohio's state income tax, pro-union policies, and weak infrastructure. This NET AGI exodus from 2021 to 2022 repeats a trend going back to at least 2011 when John Kasich became governor totaling lost AGI of \$16.44 billion from 111,221 Exodus Ohioans.

Ohioans Coming and Going, 2021–2022





CHANGE IN ADJUSTED GROSS INCOME, 2021-2022






Inflow and Outflow of Individuals in Ohio



NET CHANGE IN NUMBER OF INDIVIDUALS


